Of Native Hawaiian ancestry, Ku'ulei was born and raised on O'ahu, where her foundation in culture, community, and kuleana was shaped from an early age. A proud graduate of the Kamehameha Schools, she carried her Hawaiian values with her to Albion College in Michigan, earning a BA in Education.

Ku'ulei spent much of her professional career as President of Travelcorp, designing and executing deluxe group incentive travel programs to destinations around the world. Her work blended logistics, hospitality, and relationship-building — skills that would later become central to her leadership in the Hawaiian community on the continent.

In 2011, she joined the Pacific Center for Economic Development as the Director of Native Hawaiian Cultural Resources in the D.C. area, strengthening cultural connections for Hawaiians living away from home. Five years later, she continued her service at the Office of Hawaiian Affairs in Washington, D.C., advancing advocacy and representation for Native Hawaiians at the federal level.

In 2018, Ku'ulei joined Na Ali'i, part of the Nakupuna Companies headquartered in Honolulu, bringing her cultural expertise and leadership to Arlington, VA. She later served as Executive Director and Chief Cultural Officer of Lauola Pono, a Native Hawaiian organization in Northern Virginia.

Today, as the Chief Administrative Officer for Soft Power Solutions – New Frontier in McLean, VA, Ku'ulei continues to bridge culture, leadership, and strategic vision — uplifting people and strengthening organizations through values-driven work.

An active Hawaiian cultural community leader, Ku'ulei has co-founded three 501(c)(3) Native Hawaiian organizations in the DMV region and currently serves as CEO of E Ala E Hawaiian Cultural Center, headquartered in Alexandria, VA. She has also served two terms as President of the Hawai'i State Society of Washington, D.C., three terms as 1st Vice President of Ke Ali'i Maka'āinana Hawaiian Civic Club of Washington, D.C., and remains an engaged member of the Kamehameha Schools East Coast Alumni Association.

Grounded in aloha and committed to uplifting her lāhui, Ku'ulei finds joy in community, cultural stewardship, and spending time with her two (spoiled!) Siamese companions, Hōkū and Kekoa.
